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Bomet, KRCS join hands to prevent Zoonotic diseases



The County Government of Bomet in partnership with the Kenya Red Cross Society and the Community Epidemic & Pandemic Preparedness (CP3) USAID project, has rolled out a coordinated multisectoral approach dubbed "One Health Approach" to champion for prevention of zoonotic diseases such as anthrax in the county.

The approach engages the communities by training the residents on epidemic preparedness and response, and recognizing them as vital contributors to finding and stopping outbreaks, saving lives, restoring services,

reducing negative impacts, speeding recovery and building resilience
The multisectoral sensitization team has so far engaged community members in Chemagel and Kipsonoi wards.

Transforming small scale beans farming to commercial production

600 farmers from registered cooperatives societies in Bomet have gained practical farming skills and knowledge on commercial Beans production during the just concluded Beans Commercialization Production

training programme in Bomet. Among the key areas of focus of training included best farming practices geared towards upscaling small scale farming to commercial beans production and planting of beans rich in Protein, Iron and Zinc especially nyota, angaza and faida varieties.
Speaking during the workshop the CECM Agriculture,
Livestock and Fisheries Dr.
Kipchumba Toweett reiterated that the county government of Bomet targets to produce 12,000 bags (90kgs) of beans valued at estimate of Ksh 96 Million.

The training was jointly organised by the County government of Bomet, the Kenya Agriculture and Livestock Research (KALRO) and the International Centre for Tropical Agriculture (CIAT) and Pan Africa Beans Research Alliance (PABRA).
