The Governor of Bomet County, Prof. Hillary Barchok, EGH, on Monday led residents in commemorating this year's Mashujaa Day celebrations held at Kabungut Primary School in Singorwet Ward, Bomet Central Constituency. The event attracted a large gathering of residents, local leaders, and community groups who came together to honour Kenva's heroes and heroines for their sacrifices and service to the nation. While addressing the audience, Governor Barchok paid glowing tribute to the men and women who fought for Kenya's independence, describing them as patriots whose courage and resilience laid the foundation for the freedoms Kenyans enjoy today. It is essential for our people's health, for agriculture, and for economic growth. My government will not rest until every household in Bomet can access clean and reliable water."

Barchok ushers BOMWASCO into a new era of reform and innovation.

omet Governor Prof. Hillary Barchok on Tuesday presided over the official welcoming of three new members to the Board of Bomet Water and Sanitation Company Limited (BOMWASCO). The new appointees Mr. Eric Langat, Rev. Seline Rotich, and Hon. Clara Koech were introduced during a meeting attended by senior county officials and members of the company's management team.In his remarks, Governor Barchok said that the trio brings with them a wealth of knowledge and diverse professional experiences that will be instrumental in strengthening the company's leadership and steering it toward greater efficiency and sustainability. He emphasized that their appointment comes at a crucial time when the company is undergoing major restructuring aimed at enhancing operational performance and service delivery to the people of Bomet County. The Governor acknowledged that since its establishment in 2013, BOMWASCO has made remarkable progress and continues to expand its reach in providing clean and reliable water to residents across the county. The company, he said, currently manages 14 water schemes with 20,500 active connections serving approximately 123,000 consumers. He commended the company's management for the achievements made so far, noting that the progress has been realized despite facing numerous challenges over the years. While reflecting on the company's journey, Governor Barchok admitted that BOMWASCO has encountered operational and financial difficulties, particularly in areas of revenue collection, high electricity costs, and aging infrastructure. However, he expressed confidence that the company is now firmly on the path to profitability and improved service delivery. He outlined several interventions that have been undertaken to stabilize operations. Among them is the recent takeover of the Itare Water Scheme by the Lake Victoria South Water Works Agency (LVSWWA), which, according to the Governor, relieved BOMWASCO of a major consumer who had been a consistent defaulter. This move, he explained, has helped address persistent electricity cost challenges linked to unpaid water bills. He further cited the upcoming Bomet-Longisa-Mulot Water Project as a transformative initiative that will reduce operational costs by adopting a gravity-fed water system instead of electricity-powered pumping. The Governor also mentioned that the company's sta ffrestructuring programme had successfully reduced the workforce to under 100 employees through voluntary early retirement, thereby enhancing efficiency and reducing the wage bill. In addition, a clear payment plan for outstanding sta ffemoluments

In addition, a clear payment plan for outstanding sta ffemoluments has been introduced and tied to the company's improved revenue collection framework. Governor Barchok also announced plans to move towards 100 percent metering of consumers, a move aimed at eliminating the flat-rate billing system and promoting fairness and accountability in water usage. He noted that the County Government of Bomet continues to play a critical role in supporting BOMWASCO's operations through subsidies and investment in infrastructure. The Governor further pointed out that solarization of water schemes is a key component of the company's modernization plan, aimed at reducing dependency on costly grid electricity. The solarization of Bomet Town Water Supply, he said, has already been completed, while the Longisa Town project is nearing completion and is expected to significantly reduce operational costs once fully commissioned. Governor Barchok, however, underscored that the company still faces several pressing challenges. These include non-payment of bills by consumers, theft of water through illegal connections, destruction of water pipes by ongoing road construction works, aging and outdated pumping equipment that require major capital investment, high electricity bills, and pending sta ffemoluments. He assured residents that his administration remains committed to addressing these challenges through strategic partnerships, prudent management, and continued investment in water infrastructure. He added that with the new leadership in place, BOMWASCO is better positioned to deliver on its mandate and to provide reliable, sustainable, and affordable water services to the people of Bomet."I have full faith in the team we have put in place," Governor Barchok said. "They have my total support and the support of the County Government as they work to take BOMWASCO to the next level."The meeting was also attended by Deputy Governor H.E. Bomet Municipality has embarked on an ambitious plan to enhance the transportation system within Bomet Town, in a move aimed at improving order, easing congestion, and promoting efficiency in public transport operations. According to officials from the Bomet Municipality, the new strategy focuses on consolidating transport operations under one central system to streamline services and improve traffic management across the town. The main bus park has been identified as the central hub for all bus, car, and Nissan operations, an initiative expected to significantly reduce congestion within the town's central business district. Municipal authorities explained that the main bus park will now serve as the sole transport station in Bomet Town, featuring two main entrances and a designated exit point. They noted that this new layout is designed to create a more organized environment for both passengers and transport operators while ensuring smoother traffic flow within and around the town. In addition, the construction of a new exit at the main bus park was highlighted as a proactive measure aimed at addressing persistent traffic bottlenecks along the main highway. The new traffic management plan, officials emphasized, will not only enhance safety but also improve accessibility and reduce unnecessary delays for commuters. The municipality further stated that this initiative is being implemented through a collaborative approach involving the Departments of Lands, Housing, and Urban Planning, in partnership with the Kenya Traffic Police. This joint effort, they said, reflects a coordinated and multi-sectoral commitment to improving the overall transport infrastructure in Bomet Town.Beyond addressing congestion, municipal leaders pointed out that the reorganization of transport operations is expected to improve revenue collection, streamline parking management, and eliminate illegal pick-up and drop-o ffpoints along the highway. Such improvements, they added, are vital for ensuring the long-term sustainability of urban transport systems.

The County Government of Bomet has once again demonstrated its commitment to improving the wellbeing and future of its youngest citizens through enhanced investments in Early Childhood Development (ECD). During a three-day sensitization workshop held in Bomet, officials from the Lake Region Economic Bloc (LREB) through the Smart Start Initiative underscored that Early Childhood Development (ECD) remains one of the most critical investments any society can make. The discussions emphasized that ECD determines not only a child's lifelong physical growth and brain development but also their overall wellbeing and future productivity. According to the facilitators, the foundation of a child's health and development begins long before birth. Factors such as the mother's health during pregnancy, postnatal care, breastfeeding, nutritional intake, environmental safety, and the early learning experience in ECDE centers all play an essential role in shaping a child's cognitive and physical development. The LREB Smart Start team further explained that Nurturing Care for Early Childhood Development (NCfECD) requires a holistic and multi-sectoral approach. The team emphasized that governments at both county and national levels must strengthen interventions that promote NCfECD, including policy formulation, budgetary allocation, and effective implementation of relevant programs. The ongoing sensitization workshop in Bomet brought together key county officials for three separate sessions—dedicated to County Executive Committee Members (CECs) on Day One, Chief Officers (COs) on Day Two, and Directors on Day Three. The training aimed to enhance understanding among policy makers and senior administrators about the importance of nurturing care in early childhood and to inspire integrated planning and budgeting across sectors. Speakers at the forum commended Bomet County Government for being at the forefront in promoting child welfare and nutrition. The county has implemented a range of innovative interventions, including the School Milk Program, which ensures ECDE learners receive a nutritious supplement during school hours, improved maternal and child health services, and community-based nutrition programs targeting new mothers. Additionally, the county has introduced a high-iron and zinc bean initiative distributed to selected schools—an initiative designed to combat hidden hunger and improve nutritional outcomes among young learners.

The Department of Fisheries in Bomet County reported that the county's growing passion for fish had sparked an inspiring wave of transformation across local communities. Officials explained that what began as a simple effort to encourage fish consumption had evolved into a powerful movement reshaping livelihoods and promoting environmental sustainability. Through initiatives under the #FLLoCA and #ClimateAction programs, residents were turning climate challenges into opportunities that strengthen food security, boost household incomes, and build resilience against the effects of changing weather patterns. The department highlighted that fish farming was no longer seen as a small-scale activity but as a major economic driver creating jobs and supporting local markets. Women and youth, in particular, were stepping into leadership roles in fish farming groups, managing ponds, and marketing their produce to schools, restaurants, and neighboring counties. Officials further emphasized that beyond income, the initiative was improving nutrition among families, especially children, who now have regular access to affordable sources of protein. They added that the community's success story had become a model for other counties, showing how local innovation and climate action can go hand in hand to build sustainable futures. The County Government of Bomet, through the Department of Lands, Housing and Urban Planning, in collaboration with the State Department for Housing and Urban Development, the National Youth Service (NYS), and the Bomet Prison, held a consultative meeting to deliberate on the relocation of the existing dumpsite and the development of a new waste disposal site near the Bomet Cemetery. It was reported that the State Department for Housing and Urban Development is currently implementing the Bomet Affordable Housing Project (AHP) under the National Affordable Housing Programme. During the implementation process, it was observed that the existing dumpsite located adjacent to the Bomet AHP site posed serious environmental and public health risks to both the housing development and the surrounding community. Owing to these challenges, the stakeholders agreed that there was an urgent need to relocate the dumpsite to a more suitable location.

The County Government was said to have identified a new site for the relocation of the dumpsite, situated opposite the Bomet Cemetery. During the meeting, it was agreed that the existing dumpsite adjacent to the Bomet AHP would be relocated to the newly identified site near the cemetery. It was further resolved that a masonry block fence would be constructed around the new site to ensure proper containment and enhance security. Additionally, the access road to the new dumpsite would be graded and improved to facilitate the smooth movement of waste management vehicles and equipment. A detailed cost estimate would also be prepared to guide the next steps of engagement and implementation. It was further reported that the State Department for Housing and Urban Development had committed to providing the necessary financial resources to support the execution of the proposed works, subject to agreement on the final scope and cost estimates. The intervention was said to be a major step towards enhancing environmental sustainability, improving public health, and creating a safer and more conducive living environment within the Bomet Affordable Housing Project Phases 1 and 2.

The meeting was attended by the Chief Officer for Lands, Hon. Haron Kirui; the Assistant Deputy County Commissioner for Bomet Central, Madam Florence Akumu; Mr. J.M. Kaguchia from the National Housing Department; Mr. Ben Nzwaka from the NYS; and departmental directors, among others, under the leadership of County Secretary Mr. Simon Langat.
